INTRODUCING AN RTFHS

SOUTH COUNTRY FAMILY ALBUM

PART 1

This book was first published by the Romany and Traveller Family History Society (RTFHS) in 2007 and then reprinted in 2014.

It is a fine collection of old photographs kindly contributed by RTFHS members. These show members of their own families, mainly people who lived in or travelled in the southern counties of England, stretching from Kent to Cornwall, in the past 100 years or so.

The photos have simple captions, usually only the names of the individuals in them, where known, but sometimes with dates of birth and death, locations and relationships.

This book has been out-of-print for a number of years. The RTFHS is now making it available as two free PDF downloads: Part 1 and Part 2.

This is partly to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Society that took place in 2019 and partly to put the book's contents into the public domain again. In this way, we hope that many more people with British Romany Gypsy or Traveller roots can enjoy it and perhaps also discover an ancestor or two within its pages.

An article by Eric Otto Winstedt, entitled *Kingsley's Gypsies* (Journal of the Gypsy Lore Society Third Series Volume 22, pages 119-122, 1943) describes the family of Demon or Damon Lee. Mr Winstedt states that the woman on the left is almost certainly Vansi, daughter of Arthur and Nation Smith, and wife of Damon Lee's brother Harry. His identification of the central figure is less certain but he believes it to be Damon's sister Martha (Pat), who married Vansi's brother Jack Smith. The boy is thought to be one of her sons. Mr Winstedt can only speculate on the identity of the woman on the right, but believes that she may be one of Damon's nieces, possibly Keziah Gregory.

Foreword

When you glimpse the interior of a vardo in an old photo – or even the inside of a bender tent – there's often a family photo or two hanging or standing there. Browse through old volumes of the Journal of the Gypsy Lore Society and you'll read many accounts by the likes of the Reverend George Hall and T W Thompson, recalling the day they visited the home of a Boswell or a Smith or another friend who proudly showed them the elaborately framed portrait of a long-gone ancestor.

For the family historian of the early 21st century, such images and such tales are so tantalising. For our burning questions today are: "So where are all those wonderful photos now?" "Why did nothing get passed down to me?" Or perhaps, "Is there someone out there with a photo of their family that also happens to have my greatgranny Teni or old uncle Adolphus in the background?"

This album hopes to start to answer some of those questions. For it brings together family photos from a number of different sources, generously loaned by their owners and collated and beautifully arranged by Janet Keet-Black to create a first for the Society: a publication that focuses on images rather than on the written word.

In doing so, it is helping not only to preserve those precious photos for posterity but also to record the names of the individuals within them: something that is often lacking even in the family albums themselves. It is also making these images more widely available so that others can share this important visual heritage – and, with a great deal of good fortune, perhaps discover a missing ancestor or relative among the many faces.


