Hibbard lodges at the Boar's Head Inn, at Thornbury, and on Saturday, the 21st ult. the prisoner was there also, amusing the company by his melodious strains on the fiddle. The coat was left hanging across the settle in the tap-room. On the following day (Sunday) the prisoner left ; after which the coat was missed, and he was apprehended at Grovesend, near Thornbury, with the coat in his possession. On the following morning (Sunday), the prisoner left, soon after which the coat was missed, information was given to the police, and suspicion having fallen upon the prisoner he was apprehended the same morning with the coat in his possession. P.C. Defendant was drunk and the landlord requested me to turn him out. I did so after some difficulty. Defendant went to another public house and they turned him out there. On the Sunday morning I saw the defendant and his wife lying down by the side of the road at Dewchurch. He was drunk then and quarreling with his wife. A fine of 5s. with 19s. expenses was inflicted, with 14 days' hard labour in default. Defendant said if the bench would allow him till Monday to pay he could try to accommodate them, but the bench declined to accede to his request. <i>Ann Baldwin</i> , companion to the previous defendant, was with a like offence on the same occasion.
