Mr. Pritchard, of Hereford, appeared on behalf of the prisoners. - Mr. Nelmes stated that he saw the prisoners, on the 24th of February last, near the fold in which his pigs were ; that he observed the prisoner Locke coming from the direction of the cart stable with some hay in his hand, and the other prisoner, Draper, following him towards the fold in a creeping posture ; the pigs were then at the side of the fold, close to where he saw the prisoners ; about an hour afterwards (11 o'clock, a.m.) prosecutor returned to the fold, and found one of the pigs, a sow, vomiting violently ; he then went to Ross market, and, on his return, about 7 o'clock in the evening, heard that the sow was worse ; he went and saw her, and found her very much purged and so altered that he did not know her, and she died in about half an hour afterwards ; suspecting the prisoners of having poisoned the pig, he had them apprehended, and, on searching the prisoner Draper, found in his jacket pocket a linen bag containing a white powder, bearing on the outside a label with the word "poison" written on it ; the prisoner Draper said "That is not poison," and Locke said "A paper there will show you what that is for" ; the prisoner Draper fainted, and remained for several minutes apparently unconscious. - Mr. Pritchard cross-examined this witness at great length, and stated that there was a great mortality among pigs at the present time, arising from an epidemic which was very prevalent, but the prosecutor said he had not heard that it had attacked any pigs in his neighbourhood. - Thomas Williams, constable of Llangarren, stated that on the 25th ult., he apprehended the prisoners on the charge of poisoning Mr. Nelmes' pig, and searched them, and that on Draper he found a bag containing a quantity of white powder, inclosed in paper and marked "Poison," also a lump of white substance and a printed paper, containing instructions for killing rats with poison ; on the 26th ult. he went to Mr. Nelmes' and there cut open a dead sow, and took out the entire contents of the stomach, which he tied up and delivered the same day to Dr. Andrew Rowan, of Hereford, together with a portion of the white powder found on the prisoner Draper. - This witness was also subjected to a rigorous cross-examination by Mr. Pritchard, but no facts of importance were elicited. - Frederick Matthews deposed that he is a farm servant in the prosecutor's employment ; on the day the sow was taken ill, he saw the two prisoners passing along the road, leading to his master's house ; the prisoner Draper called to him and asked whether there was a pig dead ; witness told him he did not know, and the prisoner said he wanted the skin if one had died. - Dr. Rowan not having competed the analysis of the intestines and the powder found on the prisoner, the Magistrates adjourned the further hearing of the case until Thursday last. On that day, the prisoners were brought up for final examination at Messrs. Hall and Minett's office in Ross, before Mr. Thornton and Dr. Jones. - Mr. Pritchard attended on behalf of the prisoner, as on the former hearing. - The first witness examined was a lad named Morris, who usually fed the pigs. He stated that, on the 24th ult., he fed them as usual with wash at seven o'clock, and that then all the pigs appeared well ; at half-past nine the sow that subsequently died vomited very much, and continued getting worse until her death ; about nine o'clock witness saw the prisoners close to the fold in which the pigs were. - Dr. Rowan was next examined and stated that he is an analytical chemist, practising at Hereford, and that he had received the stomach and intestines of a pig from the witness Williams, and also some white powder and crystals, - the former, on analysis, proved to be a mixture of carbonate and sulphate of baryta ; the latter, nitrate of potass ; the former is a very deadly poison and may be obtained at almost any druggists ; on examination of the bowels of the pig, they appeared empty of food but very much distended with wind, the stomach being half filled with a semi-fluid of gelatinous character, containing a mixture of grain and other matters, and also distended with wind and highly inflamed ; the mucous membrane was much softened and partly denuded from the surface, and mixed with the food and blood ; these appearances would indicate the action of a virulent poison ; after analysing the contents of the stomach, the presence of a salt of baryta and potass soda was found ; the appearance of the stomach presented all the marks of the action of baryta, as laid down in the standard works on medical jurisprudence, and the pig no doubt died from such poison ; witness believed that the flesh of an animal would not be injured by baryta, as the violent purging and vomiting would carry nearly the whole out of the stomach and intestines before absorption would take place. - This being the whole of the evidence against the prisoner, Mr. Pritchard addressed their Worships, and submitted that no case had been made out against Locke ; and that his presence with the other prisoner, even supposing Draper guilty, was not sufficient to commit him upon. The Bench, however, thought that, the prisoners being seen continuously together, a jury had better decide as to their innocence or guilt ; and committed both to take their trial at the next Assizes.</p>

				<p>In consequence of the very defective state of the common law, which made the killing of a pig a mere matter of trespass, giving the owner of the pig only an action against the killer for the value of it, an act was passed in the reign of George I., which made the unlawful killing of any cattle (which word has been held to include pigs and asses) a capital felony, the same as the murder of a man. In the reign of George IV. the punishment was reduced to transportation for life, or for any term not less than seven years, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding four years ; and, by an act of the present reign, 1st of Victoria, c.90, s.32, it was further reduced to transportation for any term not exceeding 15 years or less than seven years, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding three years.</p> <p>It appeared that about the middle of February a gipsy party came to the neighbourhood of the prosecutor's farm, and were treated kindly by him. The prisoners were of the party, and asked him one day if he had any dead cattle, to which he replied that he had not. On the 24th of February the prisoners were passing through a field near his house, and Locke was seen to take something white out of his pocket and put it to the mouth of one of the prosecutor's pigs ; the pig ate it, and soon afterwards became sick, suffering from purging and vomiting, and died the next day. THE MURDER NEAR LEATHERHEAD.

It will be recollected that in our former account of these most savage and atrocious murders, it was stated that Hall, the chief officer of Union Hall, in the course of his examination of the premises on the morning that the murders were committed, discovered the old man's will in the drawer of a chest which was in his bedroom. This will was executed in the year 1805, by which it appeared that the cottage, and grounds appertaining to it were to remain in the occupation of Elizabeth Haines, his housekeeper, for one year after the testator's death, and at the expiration of that period she was to resign all claim to the property, which then devolved to his daughter. There was a codicil to this will bequeathing several articles of furniture to his housekeeper on her resigning the occupation of the cottage, which were to be selected by herself from the stock on the premises. And in the event of his daughter's death it expressed that his little copyhold estate should be sold for the benefit of her surviving children. The daughter is a married woman upwards of sixty years of age, and resides with her husband, an aged man, about eight miles from her father's cottage. On being made acquainted with the murder of her parent and his housekeeper, the daughter and her husband immediately proceeded to the cottage, and took possession of it ; and it was remarked by several persons who were present on the occasion, that neither of them exhibited the slightest horror on witnessing the murdered bodies of the deceased persons, but that strangers, to whom the unfortunate poor creatures were unknown, manifested greater feelings of sorrow on beholding the horrid spectacle. The Rev. Mr. Bolland, (who has been indefatigable in his exertions to find out some clue to the discovery of this shocking murder,) on perusing the will, and also on being made acquainted with the apathy of feeling displayed by the daughter of the deceased on the occasion, thought proper to examine her very minutely with respect to her own family. In the course of the questions put by that gentleman, after considerable reluctance she acknowledged that she had a daughter, who had cohabited with a man of very bad character. She did not know how they gained their livelihood, but knew they were in the habit of tramping about the country. She could not take upon herself to say whether they had not been lying about on the commons in the neighbourhood of Fetcham, and was not aware that either of them had been seen at the late Leatherhead fair. In reply to Mr. Bolland, she also said that she had not been in the habit of visiting her father recently. During the time occupied by these interrogatories, the husband sat by the side of the fire, and remained perfectly silent. When the examination closed, the daughter seemed only anxious about her father's will, knowing that it had been taken out of the box. She seemed to be in a terrible fright, exclaiming, "Where is the will, gentlemen? It belongs to me ; I am the rightful owner of it ; the property is mine now." Mr. Bolland checked the very improper and unnatural feeling displayed by the woman, whose whole thoughts appeared to be absorbed on the subject of the little property which came into her immediate possession, in consequence of the murder of her father and his housekeeper.

Mr. Bolland having obtained no information where it was likely the two characters alluded to could be found, gave immediate directions that every exertion should be made for that purpose.

Yesterday se'nnight a young man, named Jones, was taken into custody by one of the turnkeys of the King's Bench prison, on suspicion of being implicated in murder. It appeared that Jones had just arrived from the country, and on walking through the Borough met with the young man casually, with whom he entered into conversation on the subject of the murder. They proceeded together towards the King's Bench prison, and on their way Jones said that the old people, meaning Akehurst and his housekeeper, had been murdered by knocking them on the head with a hammer ; and the person who committed the crime, he said, only got 11. 5s. in the house. The person to whom this conversation was addressed, surprised that the stranger should know so much respecting the circumstances of the murder, immediately suspected that he had a hand in it, and accordingly mentioned the above facts to a turnkey of the Bench, who brought him down to Union-hall police office. When Jones was apprehended, he had a bundle of new clothes under his arm, which he alleged to have purchased that morning for 17s., and 8s. more being found in his pockets on searching him, the suspicion was strengthened against him. On being questioned where he had got the money, and from what part of the country he had arrived, he equivocated very much, but at length said that he had come up that morning from Leatherhead, and added that he had found the money that purchased the new clothes, and part of which was in his pocket, tied up in a white handkerchief in Leatherhead fair, on Thursday night.

When People the officer proceeded to ask him some questions relative to the murder at Fetcham, Jones said, pulling up the sleeves of his coat, " You may see that I have no blood upon me ; and if you examine those clothes you will not find a speck of blood upon them." The suspicion excited against Jones was therefore considered so strong as to warrant his detention, and he was immediately taken down to Fetcham, where he underwent an examination before Mr. Bolland, in the course of which he equivocated so grossly that scarcely a word he uttered was to be believed. At length, however, on being threatened with committal [*sic*] to prison, he became exceedingly alarmed, and told a different story of the finding of the money. It ultimately, however, was ascertained that a man named Ball had been robbed at Leatherhead fair ; and that a handkerchief found on the person of the prisoner belonged to that person. Mr. Bolland accordingly committed him for further examination ; at the same time observing that there was a considerable suspicion attached to his conduct. The prisoner was

therefore locked up in the cage on the Saturday night ; and the persons from, whom he declared he had obtained the particulars of the murder were directed to be sent for, in order to discover whether there was any truth in his assertions. During the examination Jones frequently protested his innocence of having any participation in the murders ; and before it concluded he was attacked with fits which lasted for a considerable time. Indeed, this man's conduct and behaviour since his apprehension has been so mysterious, that, independent of the charge of robbery that will be preferred against him, the Magistrates will strictly investigate whether there are grounds for suspecting that he was implicated in the murders. Intelligence reached Union-hall late on Thursday evening, from an inhabitant of Beckenham, in Kent, that a party of Gipsies had early that morning encamped near the village, and from the description given of the parties suspected of being implicated in the bloody deed, an individual among the Gipsies resembled one of the people described. Newcome, an officer from Union-hall, was instantly despatched to the place pointed out, called Green-lane, in which two tents were pitched. It was past midnight when the constable reached the spot, and it may be naturally expected the Gipsies had gone to sleep. After examining their features, he was persuaded that they were not the parties wanted. He heard that Hall and Pople, who have been out two days searching the country for the fugitives, had visited the same party in the course of the day, to whom they had left their address, in order to show if any one went to their tents, that an investigation had been already accomplished. The Gipsies, however, began to relate to Newcome that they knew very well Mary Ayres, and the man with whom she cohabits. They stated further, that they had seen them near Guildford lately, but, on further inquiry, it turned out that this was full three weeks back. On being asked where they (the party with whom Newcome was conversing) were on the night that the murder was committed, it was answered, near Seven Oaks, in Kent. They said that the murder was spoken of wherever they went. In addition to this information, we have to state, that applications from the country, from accurate and full descriptions of the suspected individuals might be sent to the parties applying, which were accordingly sent of without loss of time. A letter reached Union-hall on Friday, that a woman dressed in a similar manner to the one given of Mary Ayres, was seen in the metropolis on Monday last ; but the information being anonymous, no attention was paid to it. A rumour prevailed on Friday that suspicion now attached to another Individual, against whom, hitherto, no imputation was raised, and that the suspected party was than in custody. Grassmith, who went down to Fetcham with the Gipsies, whom he apprehended near Windsor, had not returned on Friday afternoon, nor was it known whether they had been liberated or not. The probability is they had.

FETCHAM, Friday afternoon, 6 o'clock.

It will be in the recollection of our readers, that Grassmith, the officer, proceeded to Fetcham on Thursday morning, having in his custody Thomas Walker, Fanny Walker, and Moses Draper, who were all of the Gipsy tribe, whom he apprehended near Windsor on the preceding day on suspicion of having some knowledge of the murders recently perpetrated near Leatherhead, as those parties were seen in the neighbourhood about that period. On being brought before the Rev. Mr. Bolland and -- Hankey, Esq., they were strictly examined, in the course of which they satisfactorily accounted for their time and occupation from the commencement of Leatherhead fair up to their apprehension by Grassmith. The Magistrates therefore discharged them.

The examination of the Gipsies was scarcely over, when two individuals, named Jefferies and Skelton, sought an interview with Mr. Bolland, for the purpose of communicating to him a conversation that they had had a short time previously with a girl, fourteen years of age, named Bennett, whose parents reside in the next cottage to that lately inhabited by John Akehurst and his housekeeper, on the subject of the murders, which they (the communicants) considered was of such a nature as to attach considerable suspicion to those persons. (Mrs. Bennett and her son, it will be remembered, were examined on the inquest that sat on the bodies of the old people, and, by their evidence, it appeared, that they were the first who discovered the murders on Friday morning last.) Jefferies proceeded to state, that hearing of the murders that were perpetrated at Fetcham, he went, accompanied by Mr. Skelton, to that place, for the purpose of beholding the cottage in which such horrible acts of cruelty were so recently perpetrated. On their approach towards the orchard, they observed a girl, of whom they inquired for the cottage where the murders had been committed. The girl, who subsequently informed them that her name was Bennett, pointed out the house, and without receiving any encouragement from them, began of her own accord to be very communicative, relating little anecdotes of poor Akehurst and his housekeeper, in the course of which she said, "My father and mother were up almost the whole of the night that Master Akehurst was killed." Jefferies asked the girl what they were doing, and if they were in the habit of sitting up late? The girl said not. She was then asked whether she had heard her father go out. To this she replied, that she thought she heard him open the door in the night. She then, without being questioned, said, "I heard father say to brother Tom, that if any one should ask him questions, to stick to the same story that he had told before, (it may be necessary to state here that her brother Tom was the lad whose evidence was first taken on the inquest.) Jefferies, conceiving from the girl's admissions that some suspicion attached to the family, accordingly stated the above facts to Mr. Bolland, who lost no time in investigating the matter. He sent for Bennett and his wife, and without hinting at the conversation alleged to have taken place between their daughter and Jefferies, the magistrate proceeded to put several questions to each of them on the subject. In answer to a question whether he had been up late on the night of the murder, Bennett said that both he and his wife were uneasy the greater part of that night, but from what cause their uneasiness proceeded he could not tell ; one or two of the children were unwell he recollected that night, and that circumstance might have been the cause. Mr. Bolland then asked him whether he had gone out of doors in the course of the night ? Bennett paused for a little and said, that he had got up out of bed, opened the door that led into the road, and went outside, in order to see that his neighbour's cattle were not on his grounds. He added, that it was fair-time, which caused a good deal of noise and confusion in the neighbourhood. Bennett's wife, who was not present during the interrogatories put to her husband, was subsequently questioned on the subject. She varied in some degree from Bennett's account of the night in question. She said her husband had not gone out of doors at all on Thursday night, and denied having been more uneasy on that particular night than on any other. The variation in their accounts, together with the previous circumstances detailed by the little girl, excited some suspicions, and the Magistrate granted a search-warrant, which was put into the hands of Grassmith, the officer, who proceeded to execute it ; and on carefully examining the whole of Bennett's premises, there was nothing found to implicate him in the murders, and the Magistrates therefore discharged him.

Bennett declared most solemnly, that he never cautioned his son, or said, "stick to the same story," as related by his daughter to Mr. Jefferies.

Clarke, Esq., Coroner, on Monday, the 7th inst., at Wargrave, on the body of Sibelina Draper, a Gipsy woman, who, if the statements of the husband can be relied on, would have attained the extraordinary age of 109 years next month. It appeared from the evidence that about a fortnight since the deceased and her husband, George Draper, with a daughter, camped in a lane near the above village; the deceased had been an invalid for the last seven or eight years, but her faculties were good; she had not had medical attendance for a long time. On Sunday a great many persons went to the camp to see the deceased, it being understood that she was of the age above stated; she ate her dinner and meals on Sunday as well as ever, and appeared to enjoy herself with a pipe, which she had been in the habit of smoking for many years. About half-past six in the evening, the deceased died suddenly in the presence of her husband, daughter, and a Mrs. Wise, who resided in the village, and was passing by at the time. Mr. Taylor, surgeon, of Wargrave, examined the body, and considered death arose from old age. Verdict accordingly.
