1881	14 September	Oxford, OXF	in magistrates court	<i>Charles Wilkinson</i> , general dealer, no fixed home, and <i>William Howell</i> , hawker, 24, Great George-street, Upper Pit-street, Liverpool, were charged on remand with frequenting St. Giles' fair for the purpose of committing a felony, at 3.45 p.m. on Monday, the 5th inst. - P.C. Edgar Holton deposed that he was on duty on plain clothes at the fair. He brought the prisoners to the station and searched them. On Wilkinson he found two half-sovereigns, 12s. in silver, and 11d. in bronze. There was nothing whatever on the other prisoner except a small knife. He afterwards charged them with loitering in the fair for an unlawful purpose, but they then made no answer. When before the Mayor, in the evening, they said, "If you will let us go, we will pay our railway fare and go straight away at once." Witness then put them in the cell, and prisoner Wilkinson called him to the door, and said, "Officer, don't be too hard on us." Witness said "all right," and left them. The evidence taken at the last hearing was read, and was to the effect that the constable saw Howell go amongst several ladies, and fumble among their pockets, and then hand something to Wilkinson. - By Howell : Witness saw Howell put his hand under his coat, the usual way it was done, and he observed the prisoners go into several knots of persons. He took hold of each of the prisoners by the collar. - By Wilkinson : He followed the prisoners for over an hour. He did not see them go into the show to see the performing pony. He did not see him buy apples, and pass one to the other prisoner. - By the Bench : He had two or three complaints of persons having their pockets picked, and he watched the prisoners, before he heard from some one else that they were endeavouring to pick pockets. - Howell, in addressing the Bench, asked if it was reasonable that they would have walked about the fair for an hour without doing anything. He thought it was very hard that he should be detained eight days and nine nights for doing nothing at all. He hoped the magistrates would overlook it. - The Mayor said he had given a wrong address. - Howell, continuing, said they were willing to go away, and the police could see them out of the town by the first train. - Wilkinson said it was very hard to call men of business as to their character, because they would not come without being paid. - Superintendent Head said that one of the prisoners gave a false address, and the other one refused to give any address at all. - The Mayor said he had no doubt the prisoners were at the fair for the purpose of committing a felony, but as nothing was proved against them they would be let off leniently with seven days' hard labour, as suspicious characters.	<i>The Abingdon and Reading Herald</i> , 17 September 1881, 6
