1842	29 March - 22 July	Brighton, SSX	in gaol	The Commission for holding these Assizes, will be opened on Thursday next, at the County Hall, in this town... <i>Joseph Lee</i>, 24, itinerant fiddler, and <i>James Smith</i>, 22, travelling basket-maker, charged with having in their possession, at the parish of Brighton, on the 29th day of March last, two moulds of plaster of Paris, upon which were impressed the similitude of both sides or flats of the current silver coin of this kingdom called four-penny pieces. Also with having in their possession thirty-seven pieces of counterfeit coin made to resemble shillings of the current silver coin of this kingdom, and six pieces of counterfeit coin made to resemble fourpenny pieces of the current silver coin of this kingdom.	<i>The Sussex Advertiser</i> , 19 July 1842, 3
1842	22 July	Brighton, SSX	at the Assizes	JAMES SMITH and JOSEPH LEE were indicted for feloniously counterfeiting at the parish of Brighton, two shillings of the current silver coin of the realm, on the 29 h [sic] day of March last. A second indictment was preferred, charging them with unlawfully having in their possession a certain mould with the impress of a shilling of the current silver coin. The prisoners pleaded Not Guilty. - Mr. Attree and Mr. Johnson conducted the prosecution and Mr. Clarkson defended the prisoner Lee. Henry Solomon examined by Mr. Johnson. - I went to No 3, Egremont Street, on Tuesday the 29th of March with a search warrant, Elmes and Crowhurst went with me. We went up stairs to an upper room, which we found fastened - I heard something fall when we forced open the door, and on entering the room we found the two prisoners, whom we secured. Crowhurst found upon the floor two counterfeit shillings which he gave to me, and a quantity of four-penny pieces. I observed a mould for casting shillings, which is made of plaster of Paris. On searching the room I found two other moulds concealed under the bed-clothes, one for shillings and one for four-penny pieces - there was a fire in the room. I found two knives on the table which I produce, they have portions of metal adhering to them. I found some plaster of Paris on the mantel-shelf, and also a pleyer - I found a mallet in the cupboard, and I produce a spoon which I received from Elmes. I found a fiddle which Lee claimed. Cross-examined by Mr. Clarkson. - We all went up stairs together - We did not expect to find the door open - The search warrant was obtained the day before at my instance - I know both the prisoners - Lee is a married man, but I do not know where he lives. He is a man who gets a precarious living by fiddling at public houses. It was three weeks before that I obtained information, and the last time I had any information was about 11 o'clock - it was not from the same informant - he is not a coiner, nor ever been in custody - I do not know why he is not here - I did not take my informant before the magistrate - We went direct from the street into the house, but I cannot tell how long Lee had been there - I know a person named "Jack" whom the prisoner described to me but he did not give me the information. "Jack" has been convicted of uttering base coin at Brighton. I have not seen him since his sentence. He used to live in Nottingham Street, which is adjoining the street where Smith lives - Smith has occupied those premises about 3 weeks - I never saw Smith and Jack together - I do not think that the information I received had its origin with "Jack." Re-examined by Mr. Attree. - There was found on Lee's person a good four-penny piece covered with plaster of paris [sic]. Henry Elmes examined by Mr. Attree. - I accompanied Solomon to 3, Egremont Street, and found the two prisoners in the room, who appeared much confused - I found several four-penny pieces on the floor - On Smith I found 35 counterfeit shillings and a spoon very hot - I found on Lee a four-penny piece with something white adhering to it - A small piece of metal was sticking to his gaiters. By Mr. Clarkson. - I had to pick it of his gaiters [sic]. By the Court. - The Four-penny piece fitted the mould. By Mr. Clarkson. - I never knew "Jack," I merely obeyed the orders of the Chief Constable. Owen Crowhurst corroborated the former testimony, and deposed that he saw, on pushing the door open, the poker with which it was fastened drop on the floor. Mr. Solomon recalled, and in answer to a question by the Court, stated that Lee did give an account of he Four penny piece [sic]. Martha Willard. - I let a room in my house to a Mr. Smith, about three weeks ago. Mr. Caleb Powell, Inspector of Coin to the Mint, proved that the coin was counterfeit, and which had been cast in the moulds found ; and the articles produced are such as are used generally in coining. the Four penny piece found upon Lee, has been used apparently to form a mould [sic]. Mr. Clarkson addressed the Jury in a forcible speech, for the prisoner, Lee, animadverting strongly upon the usual character of informants in general. His Lordship summoned up the evidence very minutely, and the Jury returned a verdict of "guilty" against both prisoners. Two of the horses answered the description of horses advertised in the <i>Hue and Cry</i> . - The police asked for a remand, in order to enable them to trace the property to the owner. - The bench accordingly remanded the prisoners, but allowed one of them, Susan Lee, to go at large for the purpose of procuring evidence to show that the property rightfully belonged to her father. - Josiah Lee, one of the prisoners, was then charged with obtaining two shillings of Mrs. Webb, wife of Sir E. L. Bulwer Lytton's steward, under false pretences. - It appeared that the prisoner went to Mr. Webb's house with some powder for destroying rats, which, he said, Mr. Webb had told him to leave there. 				Mr. Collier, of Parrock Farm. The whole comprised a gang of gipsies, of three generations, from the decrepit old man to the infant at the breast. / They have long infested the Old-road, and the adjacent lanes, near the Old Prince of Orange, and as long have annoyed the public by fortune-telling, begging, and stealing. Several of them were apprehended this morning, about six o'clock, under Mr. Collier's cart sheds, and others in the Old-road. Now that there are fewer foolish people from London than there were ready to be duped out of their money by these fortune-tellers, and beggars, Mr. Collier, perhaps, thinks his property will not be so safe as it has been through the summer, and is determined on their removal. The prisoners all seemed to be very much alarmed at Mr. Justice Oakes's grave address, and still graver intimations of sending them all to Maidstone gaol. Delany Baker, a young woman, was the eloquent pleader for the entire party, and in kind words, and fluent sentences, prayed the magistrates lenity in allowing them to remove to Sheerness, where, she said, they were going this morning, had they not been taken by the police. The defendants were all discharged on the faith of their promise immediately to leave the town ; and they were gravely assured if they were seen in the borough after this day they must take the consequence, which would be very different from the treatment they had now experienced.

He was a native of Brocklehurst, in the New Forest, and was, it is said, in his 86th year. He was the progenitor of a long line of descendants, having left behind him a large assemblage of aged children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. He is reported to have died worth a great deal of money. Indeed some years ago, when Charity Lee was married to one of the Stanleys, Old Joseph Lee presented her upon the occasion with one hundred spade guineas, besides trinkets, and several pieces of plate furniture. About sixty years ago he was in the habit of travelling the country around Southampton, Romsey, Lymington, and Ringwood, as a razor-grinder, and was well-known in those neighbourhoods under the <i>sobriquet</i> of Gipsy Joe. Nor were the "Waltham Blacks" in their day more formidable for deer stealing in Waltham chase than was Gipsy Joe and his party in the New Forest. Smuggling, deer stealing, poaching, and occasionally selling a few ponies at the various fairs, were Joe's mottled avocations. His artifices and manoeuvres were so skilfully managed, that he successfully eluded the vigilance of the New Forest keepers, and no farm-house larder lacked a haunch of venison when Gipsy Joe was at hand. Mr. Serjeant GASELEE wished to know how many years he served of his sentence. Lockyer said about 12 years, and as the police stated, at his last trial, that during the time he had been discharged with a ticket of leave he had endeavoured to gain an honest livelihood, the Government would not send him back to transportation to serve out the rest of his sentence. Mr. Serjeant GASELEE said that the Court could not set itself up against the Government in respect to the former conviction of the prisoner, but this was a very bad case, as he had already been imprisoned since he was liberated with his ticket of leave for 12 months. No sooner was this sentence expired than he committed another offence. The sentence upon him was that he be imprisoned and kept to hard labour for two years, and the woman to three months' imprisonment. When the male prisoner heard his sentence no description can convey an idea of the joy with which it was received by him. He threw up his arms, exclaiming, "Oh, thank you, thank you," and in an almost delirious delight rushed from the dock to the entrance to the cells ; while the female prisoner, who followed, expressed her gratitude for the leniency which had been shown to her. At the Bow-street police-court, on Saturday, <i>Charles Lee</i>, a ticket-of-leave man (known as Gipsy Lee) was brought up on a warrant for the revocation of license. The prisoner succeeded his father as King of the Gipsies, but was deposed by his subjects for deserting his wife, and eloping with a woman who was not a gipsy. After living some time with this woman in London, and existing by theft, he was in 1849 transported for life. In 1862 he was liberated on a ticket-of-leave, returned to England, and went to live with his wife at the Devil's Dyke, near Brighton. His neighbours discovering he was a ticket-of-leave man made the place too hot for him, and he came to London. He then renewed his connection with the woman on whose account he had been deposed from his dignity, and falling into his old courses was, in 1862, sentenced to two years' penal servitude. He and his friends appeared to think that on the expiration of this sentence he should be again restored to liberty. Mr. John Jones having been chosen as foreman of the jury, the following evidence was given :- Isabella Lee, wife of deceased, stated her husband was 78 years of age, he was a general dealer, and his health was fairly good. On Saturday last he went out shortly after eight o'clock, stating that he was going to the George Hotel with his violin. Witness did not see him again until Wm. Miles called at her house and told her that her husband was lying in the road, and in a few minutes afterwards he was brought home in an unconscious state. He was carried upstairs. He never spoke again. A medical man was called in and prescribed, but death ensued on the following morning. Charles Viney, flydriver, stated he knew deceased, whom he saw at the George Hotel on the evening in question. Deceased sat down there for five or ten minutes, but did not have anything to drink. Henry Hastings, carpenter, of Hailsham, deposed to seeing Lee with his violin at the Brewers Arms. He only stayed a short time and did not partake of any drink. It was then between eight and nine o'clock. James Matthews, labourer, stated he saw deceased at the Grenadier Hotel at about 8.45. He did not play his violin, and only remained there a short time. In answer to the Coroner, witness said he had known deceased for 40 years, and had never seen him the worse for drink. Annie Lee, daughter of the deceased, stated she was returning from Hailsham shortly before nine o'clock, when she noticed a horse in a two-wheel cart. The horse appeared to rear up. There was a man in the cart, and she heard another man groan. It was a very dark night, and she went straight home. She did not recognise the groans as those of her father. William Miles, groom, engaged at the Crown Hotel, stated he was driving along the Battle Road on Saturday evening at 9.15, when he passed a cart belonging to Chas. Berry who was driving. When near the Board Schools Berry, who had another man with him, called out to him asking if he was the doctor. Subsequently he saw the deceased (John Lee) sitting in the middle of the road. He then went to inform Mrs. Lee. In reply to the Coroner, witness said Chas. Berry was quite sober. The night was very dark. Frederick Barber, labourer, stated he was walking home from Harebeating on Saturday evening at 8.15. He passed the Brewers. There was no one in the road at that time; the Herstmonceaux omnibus had passed. Charles Berry, of Eastbourne, a potato and fruit salesman, said on Saturday night, at about 8.30, he was driving a light cart towards Hailsham on the Battle-road. He had an assistant, named George Berry (no relation), with him. When near the Board Schools he noticed something in the road in front of him. His horse snorted and swerved a little to the left. His assistant got out of the cart and discovered the object to be a man, who was lying in the road, and who his assistant thought was either dying or drunk. Witness told George to fetch either a doctor or a policeman. He could not remember having met the Herstmonceaux bus. By the Coroner - His assistant, when sent for a doctor, was gone about 10 minutes. George Berry, assistant to last witness, corroborated his statement. He added that after they had found the deceased he at once went to the superintendent's house, and Superintendent Willard was soon on the spot. Superintendent A. Willard stated that about 8.55 the last witness called at the court house, stating that there was a man lying in the Battle road either ill or drunk. On going down the Battle road he (witness) saw a grey horse attached to the cart by the side of the road - 14 or 15 yards further on he saw the deceased in the road. Lee was partly sitting up and Charles Berry was standing by his side. Having recognised deceased he asked him if he had been drinking, when he merely looked up but did not speak. The witness Barber then came along, and, with his assistance deceased was carried to his house a distance of about 110 yards. The night was very dark - so dark that when P.S. Vernon came upon the scene he did not recognise the superintendent only by his voice. Deceased's violin, which was found in the road, was produced, it was in a shattered condition. The coat he was wearing at the time also showed marks of a wheel, while the trousers were torn and blood stained. He (the Superintendent) was of opinion that a lamp would not throw light sufficient to show an object lying in the road at 25 yards distant. The wheel marks on the road had been examined and found to be within a foot of where the man was found. Mr. E. E. Gould, surgeon, practising at Hailsham, stated he knew deceased, whose health was generally good. He had lost the sight of one eye, and was slightly deaf. He was called to see him on Saturday at 10.15 p.m. He was then unconscious. He was bleeding from the nose, and had a contused wound on the right forehead. He gave directions for treatment, and saw him on the following morning at 5.30. He was then dead. He had since made a post-mortem examination. He had found a bruise on calf of right leg. There was a fracture at the base of the skull causing pressure on the brain. This would cause death. The internal organs were healthy. The fracture might have been caused by the head coming violently in contact with the ground. The injury to the leg might have been caused by a wheel. The jury returned the following verdict : "That deceased met with his death through being knocked down by some vehicle, but by what or which vehicle they were unable to determine." 1863	mid-June	Barking, ESS	charged with manslaughter of William NICHOLLS	Manslaughter at East Ham – Inquest on the body of William Nicholls, 24, a Gypsy, who was killed in a fight with John Lee, another Gypsy. It appeared that the deceased and Lee belonged to a tribe of Gypsies encamped on waste ground at North Woolwich. A few days ago a quarrel took place between two others of the tribe, named Lazarus Smith and Harran, but who, after fighting together for three hours, they shook hands and became friends again. On returning to the camp, however, the wife of John Lee, and the mother of the deceased Nicholls, took the matter up and fought with each other, when Lee interfered on behalf of his wife, and deceased on behalf of his mother. This fight was the subject of investigations the next day . . . at the Woolwich Police Court, when the case was dismissed. On the 15th inst., the camp broke up, and the whole tribe, numbering upwards of a hundred persons, proceeded towards East Ham. On their route Lee and Nicholls selected a spot to fight; feeling dissatisfied at the magistrate not dealing with the case, and after fighting for an hour and a half, Lee was heard to declare he had had enough and wished to give in. The deceased, however, persisted in continuing the fight, saying he was quite fresh and could “fight through a summer’s day.” They again fought and in the last round Lee struck the deceased a heavy blow under the left jaw, knocking him down and rendering him insensible. Medical aid was obtained, but the deceased expired half an hour afterwards. A post-mortem examination made on the body proved death to have resulted from an effusion of blood to the brain by a rupture of one of the blood vessels, produced by a blow or fall. The jury, after a short consultation, returned a verdict of manslaughter against John Lee as principal, and Charles Chilcott and Albert Young as aiding and abetting in the fight. 1863	15 July	London	in court	<i>CENTRAL CRIMINAL COURT, July 15.</i> <i>OLD COURT.</i> <i>(Before the LORD CHIEF BARON.)</i> <i>John Lee, Charles Chilcote and Albert Young</i> , three good-looking young men of the gipsy tribe, surrendered to take their trial on an indictment charging them with the manslaughter of William Nicholls. The prisoners were also given in charge to the jury on the coroner’s inquisition. Mr. Daly appeared for the prosecution, and the prisoners were defended by Mr. Orridge and Mr. Cooper. The evidence adduced on the part of the prosecution declared that two rival tribes of gipsies were located in the vicinity of "West Ham, in the pariah of Ilford, and that a broil had arisen between them, in consequence of a quarrel which arose between the mother of the deceased and the wife of the prisoner Lee, and a fight between the two women was terminated only on the understanding that the dispute should be settled by a conflict between the male relatives of the women, namely, the prisoner Lee and the deceased Nicholls. The contest took place in the Barking marshes, and it was shown to have been a "fair stand-up fight," in which the other prisoners, Chilcote and Young, acted as seconds, though the tribes, male and female, assisted in the general affray. In cross-examination it was elicited that the deceased was a practised pugilist, and that on the occasion of a former fight with another individual, he had been cautioned by the surgeon who had been necessarily called in to attend him, that be must not attempt to fight again, or the result must be fatal. It was further proved that the prisoner was a remarkably quiet and well-disposed young man, and that the deceased had declared that he would fight from sunrise to sunset before he would give up. Mr. Morris, surgeon, of West Ham, proved that he had been called upon to attend the deceased, but did not see him until three hours after his death. There were only slight bruises on the face and forehead, and blood was oozing from the left ear. On a <i>post-mortem</i> examination he had opened the head, chest, and abdomen of the deceased, and he found the viscera to be healthy, but there was a mass of extravasated blood on the brain. This extravasation, which was the immediate cause of death, might have been caused by a blow, a fall, or by excitement. The indications he saw were not sufficient, in his view, to justify the opinion that blows had been the proximate cause of death, and the surgeon would not say whether the death was occasioned by a blow or by excitement. The Lord Chief Baron told the jury he was clearly of opinion that instead of the prisoners being indicted for the manslaughter they ought to have been indicted for a breach of the law in having congregated for an illegal purpose.
